The Utica Academy of Science Charter School (UASCS) will provide support, challenges and opportunities for its students, and it will instill the necessary skills and knowledge in math, science, and technology to empower students, through high intellectual standards, preparing them for college, career, and citizenship. The school seeks to graduate students who can think critically and creatively, who are committed to a lifetime of learning and civic involvement, and who are conscious of local, global, and environmental issues.

### College Preparation

Fully aligned with our mission to graduate college-ready and civic-minded students, the importance of college readiness is deeply embedded in the culture at UASCS. High-quality instruction and rigorous curriculum are supported by a variety of programs during the school day, after school, and over the summer to ensure that every student has meaningful opportunities to prepare for college.

UASCS fosters a strong college-bound culture in all its buildings, offering extensive and targeted supports for college preparation. Since our first graduating class, we have consistently maintained a graduation rate higher than both the New York State and Utica City School District averages — a testament to the effectiveness of our programs and the college-going environment we have created.

We have built strong partnerships with local and regional colleges to expand opportunities for our students. UASCS offers dual-credit college-level courses in collaboration with area colleges, including articulation agreements with the Syracuse University SUPA Program, Utica University, Mohawk Valley Community College (MVCC), and SUNY ESF. Eligible sophomores, juniors, and seniors can access these courses on our high school campus or at college campuses free of charge. In the 2025–2026 school year, we will increase the number of students enrolled in dual-credit courses and provide additional support to ensure they successfully complete them. Notably, in the Class of 2025, five seniors have earned Associate degrees from MVCC, and 28 seniors have earned an average of 47 college credits each through dual-credit coursework.

Students in accelerated programs are encouraged to attend MVCC part-time or full-time during their junior and senior years based on their academic standing. To support these students, UASCS will maintain an office on the MVCC campus so they can continue to meet with our school support team. Starting in the summer, eligible scholars — beginning with incoming freshmen — can take a dual-credit U.S. Government course to get a head start on their college credits.

We will also strengthen ties with SUNY Albany, SUNY Polytechnic Institute, and other regional institutions to expand dual enrollment and early college experiences. Faculty members will be supported to become adjunct instructors at MVCC, increasing our capacity to offer college-level coursework on-site.

Our students will benefit from more micro-credential options, job shadowing, and internship opportunities to explore

a wide range of college and career pathways. Scholars will regularly participate in college fairs and trips, and we will continue to host college representatives and guest speakers to help students make informed choices about their futures.

Workshops on financial aid, scholarship opportunities, college applications, and essay writing will be scheduled regularly for students and families. College readiness planning will start as early as 8th grade with individualized goal-setting for every scholar.

At UASCS, we envision college readiness as more than just a program — it is a way of life, helping students build the academic habits, time management, and self-advocacy skills they need to thrive in college and beyond.

### Focused on STEM and Environment

At UASCS, STEM education is a cornerstone of our mission to prepare students for college and careers in technical and scientific fields. From grades 6–12, our curriculum emphasizes real-world problem-solving, exploration in science and mathematics, interactive engagement, and collaborative projects. Field trips, hands-on activities, and authentic learning experiences enrich our students' understanding of STEM concepts and environmental connections.

Our partnerships and innovative programs provide students with meaningful pathways in STEM. Examples include our collaboration with Utica University's Nursing Program, Cybersecurity Pathways with dual-credit college courses, industry-recognized EC-Council cybersecurity certifications, and the MVCC Drone Program. Our students also gain real-world exposure through visits to places like the Adirondack Wild Center, Herkimer Diamond Mines, and local science museums.

Technology is embedded across K–12, with daily access to computer labs, smartboards, iPads, one-to-one Chromebooks, internet resources, and educational apps. Our K–8 students engage with a rigorous, research-based science curriculum through Amplify Science. To further strengthen foundational skills, this year we launched Quantum Prep, a flagship STEM enrichment program for grades 3–8, which ran for six weeks, three times a week, and is expected to expand.

Our robotics team has grown significantly, competing in regional and statewide competitions in Utica, Syracuse, Clarkson, and Buffalo. Scholars at both the middle and high school levels participate in regional STEM competitions such as the CNY Catapult Challenge, CNY Bridges: Build 'Em & Bust 'Em, the CNY Rocket Team Challenge, and the Utica University Regional Science Fair. Our science project teams have also showcased their talents at prestigious events like the International Genius Olympiad in the USA and the International Greenwich Olympiad (IGO) in the UK.

This year, we introduced a Dual Credit First Aid course for seniors, enabling the majority of participants to earn their CPR certifications — a valuable life skill and career asset. In addition, our high school Physics scholars produced the first-ever UAS maple syrup, tapping and collecting sap from maple trees on campus, demonstrating practical applications of scientific concepts.

To expand interest and engagement, we have increased the number of STEM clubs offered to middle and high school students and have added more guest speakers from STEM fields to our annual activity calendar. Co-curricular activities, internships, and job-shadowing opportunities related to STEM are actively being expanded to help students envision diverse futures in science and technology.

As a school with a strong focus on STEM and environmental awareness, UASCS remains committed to nurturing curiosity, innovation, and real-world skills that empower our scholars to become the problem-solvers and leaders of tomorrow.

### Glocal Education

UASCS has a celebratory atmosphere and promotes positive attitudes through quarterly recognition and rewards for academic efforts and citizenship evidence through certificates, gift certificates, and/or invitations to an annual Dean's List breakfast for students and their families. At the K-5 level, scholars are recognized in monthly assemblies for various awards based on character traits, attendance, and other incentives. At UASCS, volunteering is core to the school's identity. Community service is an incredibly enriching experience that benefits all students – personally, academically, and professionally. K-5 scholars participate in multiple events throughout the school year to give back to their community, including fundraisers, food, coat, and toy drives and good stewardship for the environment around Earth Day. UASCS sets the bar high and requires 6-12 students to have at least 50 hours of community service for graduation. Community involvement directly carries the school experience into the real world through higher education, work, family, and community and civic affairs. By recognizing challenges and taking part in solving them, students become better problem solvers and gain real-life application experience. Such success typically leads to a can-do attitude that spreads to academic and work pursuits. In turn, colleges and workplaces view volunteerism as a positive and desirable applicant characteristic. These student volunteers are seen as more dependable, responsible, able to follow instructions, become committed citizens, and have intrinsic motivation. In recent years, UAS has committed to hiring its current graduates as full-time staff to serve their community after graduation. Meeting its key design elements is a significant accomplishment, particularly regarding the glocal education vision. We have had more than 15 VIP visits from prominent figures in the business, scientific, and educational communities. Our focus has been promoting women in leadership positions and highlighting local career opportunities in STEM. Also, developing strategic partnerships with prominent local organizations.

### Student-Centered School Structure

UASCS schools offer a small, safe, and nurturing environment for all students. Now operating on a new, state-of-the-art campus serving our full capacity, each school section is structured to feel like a close-knit community. Each division has an academic leader (Dean of School) and a Dean of Students and/or Behavioral Specialists who support students' social, emotional, and behavioral growth. By maintaining small school communities within our larger campus, UASCS ensures that every staff member knows students personally, fostering a family-like atmosphere built on trust, safety, and strong relationships.

This approach provides a disciplined and supportive environment for students and staff. Small class sizes reinforce this: in grades 7–8 math and ELA, two teachers work with students to maintain an average student-to-teacher ratio of 1:12, while grades K–2 classrooms have two teachers with an average ratio of 1:14. Students in grades 3–5 receive additional support from intervention teachers to address academic needs, and many high school courses are also delivered in small-group settings.

Our commitment to a safe and nurturing school climate extends beyond academics. At the middle and high school levels, two dedicated school counselors provide Social Emotional Learning (SEL) programming and activities in partnership with community organizations such as the Neighborhood Center. Counselors also coordinate a comprehensive Grades 6–12 school climate survey to ensure we listen to and act on student feedback.

Student leadership is cultivated through active National Honor Society and Student Council chapters, which offer opportunities for students to represent their peers' voices and develop leadership skills. Our college counselor and teaching faculty collaborate during grade-level meetings to help each scholar set and monitor individual goals for academic growth and college readiness.

Every Wednesday, middle and high school students participate in after-school club day, choosing from a wide range of clubs that reflect their interests or even founding new ones. Clubs range from Henna Club, Computer Games Club, Fitness Club, and Gardening Club to specialized options like the Medical Professions Club — all designed to promote student engagement and connection.

In addition, our Deans of School and behavior teams are trained in Therapeutic Crisis Intervention for Schools (TCIS) and have begun training building staff on these strategies to improve classroom behavior and overall school climate.

Both parent and staff surveys consistently highlight that our small, family-like environment and the individual

attention each student receives are what make UASCS a safe, supportive place for students to thrive — academically, socially, and emotionally.

### Parental Involvement and Home Visits

Students' success and performance are affected not only by teachers but also by their parents and environment. Therefore, parental involvement is a significant part of our school's strategic goals. UASCS Parent Involvement Committee (PIC) at the 6-12 level and Family School Alliance (FSA) at the K-5 level constantly work with the local community, school administration, and teachers to plan activities and events and increase parental participation throughout the year. The school's staff perform home visits to learn more about our students and to create a supportive triad of parent-student-teacher relationships. Teachers and families communicate and rally around students during home visits to maximize support. The majority of staff have completed 12+ home visits this year.

### Performance-based accountability

The school must achieve academic and organizational excellence through outstanding instructional quality and key design elements to remain a viable educational alternative in the community. Student performance, teaching, and learning are measured monthly and/or quarterly through data collected and tracked by multiple assessment instruments, including STAR Early Literacy, Math, and Reading, Benchmark Exams utilizing eDoctrina Software, and full-length practice tests for state assessments. Elementary teachers assess students' reading levels throughout the year, utilizing Fountas & Pinnell. Teachers and school administrators document, analyze, and review student performance. Teachers create intervention plans based on assessment results to improve individual student achievement. This allows teachers to address all students' strengths and areas for improvement with targeted intervention services. There is an extensive teacher observation and enrichment program in which every teacher is given feedback, with resources tailored to their individual needs using NYSED-approved models, such as the Marzano Compendium for teacher evaluation. Both buildings have an instructional coach who performs class observations and provides feedback to improve teacher instruction. Deans and coaches have received training throughout the year on how to better coach teachers by focusing on key Marzano elements. Research shows that performance-based accountability policies and the information they provide encourage teachers to work harder, focus on research-based instructional practices, and develop their instructional capacities. Therefore, teachers are incentivized based on student performance and extracurricular activities.

#### **B.** Emergency Conditional Clearances

Charter schools are **strongly discouraged** from using the emergency conditional clearance provisions for prospective employees. This is because the school must request clearance through NYSED TEACH, and the school's emergency conditional clearance of the employee terminates <u>automatically</u> once the school receives notification from NYSED regarding the clearance request. Status notification is provided for all prospective employees through the NYSED TEACH portal within 48 hours after the clearance request is submitted. Therefore, at most, a school's emergency conditional clearance will be valid for only 48 hours after approval by the board.

Schools are not permitted to renew or in any way re-establish a prospective employee's emergency conditional clearance after status notification is sent by NYSED through the TEACH portal.





WHEREAS, SANY would like to benefit the higher rate of return in the market for the fund in the SANY school's checking accounts. The district management would recommend investing the available fund in the CD account and also utilize the MMDA with a variable rate for municipal checking accounts. Currently, terms are up to 7 months, and the Annual Percentage Yield is 4.4% at Pathfinder.

RESOLVED, that SANY will allocate \$8M to invest in the CD accounts with 4.4% at Pathfinder Bank for 7 months and \$2M to invest in the CD accounts at Berkshire Bank with 4.25% for 13 months is hereby approved.

- 2. Monday, May 19th, 2025: Ms. Mitscher's small reading group at Citizenship & Science Academy of Syracuse Elementary School recently brought a story to life meaningfully. After reading a heartwarming tale about two pen pals, the students were inspired to embark on their own pen pal adventure. They wrote thoughtful letters introducing themselves and eagerly waited for replies. To their excitement, responses arrived! The Atoms were thrilled to learn more about their new friends, making connections that went far beyond the pages of their book. #### **CSA Rochester**



#### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Trustees Science Academies of New York Charter Schools Syracuse, New York

#### **Opinion**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools (a New York State nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2025, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools as of June 30, 2025, and the changes in net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### **Basis for Opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

#### **Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements**

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not absolute assurance and therefore, is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements, including omissions, are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards*, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

#### **Report on Summarized Comparative Information**

We have previously audited Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' 2024 financial statements, and we expressed an unmodified audit opinion on those audited financial statements in our report dated October 28, 2024. In our opinion, the summarized comparative information presented herein, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2024 is consistent, in all material respects, with the audited financial statements from which it has been derived.

#### **Report on Supplementary Information**

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The Statement of Activities per School, as required by the New York State Education Department, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

#### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated October 27, 2025 on our consideration of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools' internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Science Academies of New York Charter Schools's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

### NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Organization

Science Academies of New York Charter Schools (the School) is a not-for-profit education corporation that operates four public charter schools. Syracuse Academy of Science Charter School maintains grades K-12 in Syracuse, NY. Utica Academy of Science Charter School maintains grades K-12 in Utica, NY. Citizenship and Science Academy of Syracuse Charter School maintains grades K-9 and plans to expand to grade 12 by 2027. Citizenship and Science Academy of Rochester Charter School maintains grades K-4 and plans to expand to grade 6 by 2026. All four charters place a special emphasis on math, science, and technology. The School seeks to empower students through high intellectual standards and prepare them for college, career, and citizenship. The School obtains its revenue mainly from charter school basic tuition from the Syracuse City School District, Utica City School District, Rochester City School District, and a few other surrounding school districts, in addition to food service, and state and federal grants.

The main programs of the School are as follows:

REGULAR EDUCATION: The School's curriculum is focused on mathematics, science, and technology. The School seeks to graduate students who can think critically and creatively who are committed to a lifetime of learning and civic involvement, and who are conscious of local, global, and environmental issues. All courses align with the New York State Learning Standards.

SPECIAL EDUCATION: The School is open to all children and does not discriminate on the basis of ethnicity, national origin, gender, disability, or any other grounds that would be unlawful or deny the civil rights of any individual. In accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the Rehabilitation Act, Section 504, and the Americans with Disabilities Act, the School provides a free and appropriate education, in the least restrictive environment to students with disabilities. The primary service delivery for students with special needs is inclusion. Services for students requiring supplemental services are provided by the Syracuse, Utica, and Rochester City School Districts.

OTHER PROGRAMS: Other programs include food services, athletics, and extra-curricular activities.

#### **Basis of Accounting**

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

#### Net Assets

In accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the School reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to the existence or absence of donor or grantor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions – Net assets available for use in general operations and not subject to donor (or certain grantor) restrictions. The board did designate funds. See Note 8 for more information.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions – Net assets subject to donor (or certain grantor) imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both.

Contributions restricted by donors are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions expire (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished) in the reporting period in which the revenue is recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions, based on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statements of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

There were no net assets with donor restrictions at June 30, 2025 and 2024.

#### Accounts and Grants Receivable

Receivables are stated at the amount management expects to collect. Amounts that management believes to be uncollectible after collection efforts have been completed are written off. In addition, management evaluates the need for, and if appropriate, provides an allowance to reduce receivables to amounts management expects will be collected. Management determines the allowance for uncollectible accounts receivable based on historical information, adjusted for current conditions, and reasonable and supportable forecasts. Management determined that no allowances were necessary at June 30, 2025 and 2024.

#### Revenue and Revenue Recognition

A portion of the School's revenue is derived from cost-reimbursable federal and state contracts and grants, which are conditioned upon certain performance requirements and/or the incurrence of allowable qualifying expenses. Amounts received are recognized as revenue when the School has incurred expenditures in compliance with specific contract or grant provisions. Amounts received prior to incurring qualifying expenditures are reported as refundable advances in the statement of financial position. The School did not have any cost-reimbursable grants that have not been recognized at June 30, 2025. The School was awarded cost-reimbursable grants \$13,088 that have not been recognized at June 30, 2024, because qualifying expenditures have not yet been incurred. There were no refundable advances at June 30, 2025 and 2024.

Funding sources may, at their discretion, amend the grant and contract amounts. In addition, reimbursement for expenses or return of funds, or both, may be requested as a result of noncompliance by the School with the terms of the grants and contracts. The School records such amendments, reimbursements, and returns of funds as an adjustment to revenue in the year of the amendment.

The School recognizes revenue derived from tuition and food service. Tuition income is recognized during the school year based on enrollment. Food service revenue is recognized when earned at the time of service.

#### Contributions

The School recognizes contributions when cash, securities or other assets, an unconditional promise to give, or a notification of a beneficial interest is received. Contributions that are expected to be received in future years are recorded at their present value. Conditional promises to give, that is, those with a measurable performance or other barrier and a right of return, are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been met.

#### **Property and Equipment**

Property and equipment are stated at cost. The School capitalizes property and equipment with an estimated life of 2 or more years and amounts over the following thresholds:

Depreciation and amortization expense amounted to \$2,714,814 and \$2,263,689 for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, respectively.

#### Functional Expenses

The costs of providing the various program services have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of functional expenses. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among program, and management and general categories. An immaterial amount of fundraising costs for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024 are included in management and general expenses.

The financial statements report certain categories of expenses that are attributed to both program, and management and general functions. Therefore, allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied is required. The expenses that are allocated include occupancy, repairs and maintenance, insurance and depreciation, which are allocated on a square footage basis, as well as salaries and wages, benefits, payroll taxes, other purchased services, student services, supplies, office expenses, and other expenses, which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort for each category.

#### Advertising

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred.

#### Determining Fair Value of Financial Assets and Liabilities

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America established a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

- Level 1: Inputs to the valuation method are unadjusted quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
- Level 2: Inputs to the valuation method include:
  - quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
  - quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets:
  - inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
  - inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlate correlation or by other means.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation method are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used, need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

#### Comparative Financial Information

The financial statements include certain prior year summarized comparative information in total. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the School's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2024 from which the summarized information was derived.

#### Income Taxes

The Internal Revenue Service has determined that the School is qualified as a charity exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. As a result, no provision for federal or state income taxes has been made.

#### Use of Estimates in the Preparation of Financial Statements

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts of assets and liabilities, revenues and expenses, and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could vary from those estimates.

#### **NOTE 2 - LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY**

The School regularly monitors the availability of resources required to meet its operating needs and other contractual commitments. For purposes of analyzing resources available to meet general expenditures over a 12-month period, the School considers all expenditures related to its ongoing activities, as well as the conduct of services undertaken to support those activities to be general expenditures.

At June 30, the following financial assets could readily be made available within one year of the statement of financial position date to meet general expenditures:

#### NOTE 3 - CASH, CASH EQUIVALENTS, AND RESTRICTED CASH

For purposes of the statements of cash flows, cash, cash equivalents, and restricted cash include all cash on hand and in banks, which at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The School considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents. Certain of these accounts are not federally insured, however, the School does have a collateral agreement with their bank that provides a possible avenue of recovery in the unlikely event of a bank failure. The School has not experienced any losses in these accounts and does not believe it is exposed to any significant credit risk with respect to cash, cash equivalents, and restricted cash.

The School maintains cash in an escrow account in accordance with the terms of their charter agreement. The escrow is restricted to fund legal and other costs related to the dissolution of the School. The School also maintains funds on behalf of the students. The amounts collected are reported as a liability on the statement of financial position.

#### **NOTE 4 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS**

The School leases schools and office space from Terra Science and Education, Inc. ("Terra"). Terra and the School share one common board member. This board member abstains from voting matters affecting both the School and Terra and is not paid a salary from the School. Total rent expense paid to Terra for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024 was \$2,498,053 and \$2,445,143, respectively. Terra also holds \$250,523 of security deposits due to the School at the termination of the building leases as of June 30, 2025 and 2024.

#### **NOTE 4 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS (Continued)**

During the year ended June 30, 2020, the School entered into a memorandum of understanding with Terra to provide funding for leasehold improvements totaling \$200,000. This amount is considered prepaid rent for 60 months. During the years ended June 30, 2023 and 2022, the School entered into additional memorandums of understanding with Terra to provide funding for leasehold improvements totaling \$80,000 and \$130,000, respectively. These amounts are considered prepaid rent for 36 months. The School has reduced the operating lease liability by the prepaid amounts and is recognizing monthly rent expense over these time periods. For the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, the balance of prepaid rent left to recognize was \$66,667 and \$176,667, respectively.

#### **NOTE 5 - INVESTMENTS**

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair market value. Unrealized gains or losses on securities result from differences between the cost and fair market value of securities on a specified valuation date.

Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, economic conditions, world affairs and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying financial statements.

Investments are held in investment funds managed by professional investment advisors. A summary of investments at market value at June 30 are as follows:

#### **NOTE 6 - PENSION EXPENSE**

The School participates in the New York State Teachers' Retirement System (System), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer, defined benefit pension plan administered by the New York State Teachers' Retirement Board. The System provides retirement, disability, withdrawal, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries as authorized by the Education Law and the Retirement and Social Security Law of the State of New York.

Plan members who joined the System before July 27, 1976 are not required to make contributions. Those joining after that date and before January 1, 2010, who have less than ten years of service or membership are required to contribute 3% of their annual salary. Those joining on or after January 1, 2010 and before April 1, 2012 are required to contribute 3.5% of their annual salary for their entire working career. Those joining on or after April 1, 2012 are required to contribute between 3% and 6%, dependent upon their salary, for their entire working career.

Employers are required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The rate applicable to the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024 was 10.11% and 9.76%, respectively. The total retirement contribution expense for the System was \$2,150,114 and \$1,648,301 for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, respectively.

The School also has a 403(b) annuity retirement plan for its employees. Employees that are not eligible for the New York State Teachers' Retirement System, and who work more than 20 hours per week, are made eligible immediately upon employment and may contribute a portion of their taxable salary not to exceed the statutory limits each year. Eligible employees may also receive discretionary amounts the School contributes. The School matches contributions up to \$200 per month and \$2,000 per year. The total 403(b) contribution expense was \$99,449 and \$88,610 for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, respectively.

#### **NOTE 7 - LEASES**

The School determines if an arrangement is or contains a lease at inception. Leases are included in right-of-use (ROU) assets and lease liabilities in the statements of financial position. ROU assets and lease liabilities reflect the present value of the future minimum lease payments over the lease term, and ROU assets also include prepaid or accrued rent. Operating lease expense is recognized on a straight-line basis over the lease term. The School does not report ROU assets and leases liabilities for its immaterial or short-term leases (leases with a term of 12 months or less). Instead, the lease payments of those leases are reported as lease expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

#### **NOTE 7 - LEASES (Continued)**

The School evaluated current contracts to determine which met the criteria of a lease. The ROU assets represent the School's right to use underlying assets for the lease term, and the lease liabilities represent the School's obligation to make lease payments arising from these leases. The ROU assets and lease liabilities, all of which arise from operating leases, were calculated based on the present value of future lease payments over the lease terms. The School has made an accounting policy election to use a risk-free rate in lieu of its incremental borrowing rate to discount future lease payments.

The School is obligated under operating leases for nine buildings. The leases can be terminated with a ten month notice. For each lease, the School is responsible for payment of utilities, maintenance, and real property taxes.

The first lease term ends June 30, 2026. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$44,423 with an escalation clause equal to the greater of 4% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States.

The second lease term ends June 30, 2026. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$30,109 with an escalation clause equal to the greater of 4% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States beginning in fiscal year June 30, 2024.

The third lease term ends June 30, 2029. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$23,918 with an escalation clause equal to the greater of 4% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States.

The fourth lease term ends June 30, 2032. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$28,187 with an escalation clause to an amount equal to the greater of 4% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States.

The fifth lease term ends January 30, 2060. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$29,338. The lease has an escalation clause equal to the greater of 4% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States. The lease has an option to renew for six additional ten year terms which it is not reasonably certain to exercise. Additionally, there is a level of uncertainty that they will remain in the building beyond ten years and may exercise their right to cancel with ten months notice. Therefore, the payments beyond the first ten years of the lease and those associated with the extensions are not included in the ROU asset and the lease liability recognized as of June 30, 2024 and 2023.

#### **NOTE 7 - LEASES (Continued)**

The sixth lease term ends July 31, 2027. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$30,563. The lease has an escalation clause equal to the greater of 2.5% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States. The lease has an option to renew two additional five year terms which it is not reasonably certain to exercise. Therefore, the payments associated with these extensions are not included in the ROU asset and the lease liability recognized as of June 30, 2025 and 2024.

The seventh lease term ends June 30, 2027. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$8,373. The lease has an escalation clause equal to the greater of 2.5% or the Consumer Price Index percentage figure relating to the Northeast region of the United States. The lease has an option to renew two additional five year terms which it is not reasonably certain to exercise. Therefore, the payments associated with these extensions are not included in the ROU asset and the lease liability recognized as of June 30, 2025 and 2024.

The eighth lease term ends June 30, 2029. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$7,300. The lease has an escalation clause equal to 2% for the second year. Terms are to be negotiated for years beginning after June 30, 2026. Due to no set terms, the payment associated with the lease after the year ending June 30, 2026 are not included in the ROU asset and liability recognized as of June 30, 2025.

The ninth lease term ends June 30, 2029. Rent is payable in monthly installments of \$7,523. The lease has an escalation clause equal to 2% for the second year. Terms are to be negotiated for years beginning after June 30, 2026. Due to no set terms, the payment associated with the lease after the year ending June 30, 2026 are not included in the ROU asset and liability recognized as of June 30, 2025.

The School is also obligated under operating leases for seven copiers. Three copier leases are through June 30, 2028, and four leases are through June 30, 2027.

#### **NOTE 9 - DONATED SERVICES AND GOODS**

The School receives donated services that, although substantial, do not meet the criteria for recording as revenue and expense under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. During the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, 9 and 11 active volunteers provided approximately 775 and 815 hours of service, respectively.

The School receives food commodities from the U.S. Department of Agriculture for use in the Food Services Program. During the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, the School received in-kind food donations of \$146,845 and \$122,153, respectively. The value of this donation is based on original cost provided by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. See Note 10 for information on State Aid received for books, computer hardware and software.

The School's policy related to gifts-in-kind is to utilize the assets given to carry out the mission of the School. If an asset is provided that does not allow the School to utilize it in its normal course of business, the asset will be sold at its fair market value as determined by an appraisal or by a specialist depending on the type of asset.

#### NOTE 10 - SPECIAL EDUCATION AND OTHER SUPPORT

Some of the special education services required by students of the School are provided by the Syracuse, Utica, and Rochester City School Districts. The Syracuse, Utica, and Rochester City School Districts also provided transportation and nursing services. The School was unable to determine a value for these services, thus, these financial statements do not reflect revenue or expenses associated with those services.

The School receives State Aid in the form of textbooks, computer hardware, computer software, and library materials through the Syracuse, Utica, and Rochester City School Districts. The total aid received for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024 was \$172,567 and \$214,649, respectively. The value of this aid is provided by the City School Districts and is based on original cost.

We have audited the financial statements of Science Academies of New York Charter Schools for the year ended June 30, 2025. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, *Government Auditing Standards* and the *Uniform Guidance*, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our Audit Plan provided to you prior to the engagement. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

#### **General Observations and Significant Audit Matters**

- Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by Science Academies of New York Charter Schools are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during the year ended June 30, 2025. We noted no transactions entered into by the Organization during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.
- Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimates affecting the financial statements include areas such as revenue recognition, functional allocation of expenses, and inkind valuation.

- The *financial statement disclosures* are neutral, consistent, and clear. Certain financial statement disclosures are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. The most sensitive disclosures affecting the financial statements include the disclosures of Related Party Transactions in Note 4, Investments in Note 5, and Leases in Note 7 to the financial statements.
- *Management may disagree with auditors* about areas needed to be accessed for audits or about conclusions that are reached with respect to amounts or disclosures. Management may explain their position and may also reach out to other CPAs or experts. We did not have any such disagreements or difficulties with management.
- Whenever we become aware of *adjustments or corrections* that are not clearly trivial, we will discuss them with management. Management approved all accounting adjustments that were proposed and recorded to make your financial statements materially correct.
- We have requested certain *representations from management* that are included in the management representation letter.
- In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Organization's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts.
